DIBS Accomplishments

Where does our money come from? Where does our money go? And, by the way, what has DIBS accomplished in 2018?


- DIBS began 2018 with a healthy account balance of \$103,079 largely due to a generous donation (\$110,000 in March 2017 from Harriett Wright's Estate) which was not fully spent in 2017.
- DIBS purchased a lot on **General Wilkinson Place** (Gorgas Swamp) from the Dauphin Island Foundation in April.
- DIBS purchased a lot on **Hunley Place** (Tupelo Gum Swamp) from private owners in June.
- DIBS purchased a dune lot on Hernando Street (between Tupelo Gum Swamp and Gorgas Swamp) from the Dauphin Island Foundation in July.
- DIBS paid the minimal monthly water bill for the "drip" in the Shell Mounds and plumbing work by Mike Wilson.
- DIBS paid dues to Partnership for Gulf Coast Land Conservation, Dauphin Island Property Owners Association, and Land Trust Alliance.
- DIBS paid insurance on property and the Board of Directors with Burkholder Insurance.
- DIBS sent the newsletter, News from the Island, to the membership by mail in April and September.
- DIBS established an agreement with Doug McClure to maintain established trails as needed on a monthly basis in Spring, Summer, and Fall in the Porter Lot, Ani Lot, and Goat Trees.
- DIBS provided bird books, framed bird pictures, brochures, bird checklists, bird seed packages, and birding information to the new Dauphin Island Welcome Center.






- DIBS paid final property taxes in December on three lots acquired in 2018 (General Wilkinson Place, Hernando Street, Hunley Place) and 1 lot acquired in December 2017 (Houston Pl. in Tupelo Gum Swamp).
- Lynne Fitzgerald organized a clean-up and eradication effort of cogan grass and other invasive plants from properties on Grant Street/Steiner Block in conjunction with Michael Jordan and Eva Barnett during the growing season. Afterwards, plants from the Weeks Bay plant sale were purchased and placed in the lots.
- Ann McLaurin and Lynne Fitzgerald organized an informal Economic Impact Survey conducted with the aid of spring birders and visitors on the island. Results from the survey, presented at the summer Board meeting, indicated that birders visiting the island in one weekend spent approximately \$62,000 at businesses on the island; these results will be shared with the island's governmental body.
- Nancy and Jim Gaines set up an Amazon Smile account for DIBS.
 Amazon Smile donates 0.5% of the price of eligible purchases when individuals shop at smile.amazon.com. There is no cost to the shopper and Dauphin Island Bird Sanctuaries Inc. benefits every time you shop and choose DIBS as your favorite charitable organization. The first check was received by DIBS in October 2018. Shop DIBS at Amazon Smile to help!
- Plans were proposed to refurbish the DIBS kiosk in the Shell Mounds, update and distribute the DIBS information brochure and DI bird checklist, and make adjustments to the DIBS membership levels. Several grants were written by members to Cornell University's Ornithology Lab and National Fish and Wildlife Federation.
- DIBS members/donors are an amazing group of like-minded people whose interest in protecting Dauphin Island "for the birds" has delivered an important part of the funding for DIBS during the past 25+ years. During 2018, members provided \$10,450 in "dues" to support the mission of DIBS. Many of these same members and other individuals sent additional Land Acquisition donations (\$5,825) and Alabama Ornithological Society (AOS) meeting donations (\$2,362).
- DIBS is currently holding several monetary assets in reserve. Due to the generous donation of AFLAC stock by Ed Senter and Jessica Germany, DIBS's AFLAC account had a value of \$56,039 as of December 2018. The Vanguard investment account, which was set up by the previous treasurer, Mary Porter, and the DIBS Board Members in August 2006, had value of \$118.285 as of December 2018.
- DIBS ended 2018 in the black with a balance of \$66,141 in our checking account, again largely due to another generous donation (\$62,338) from Harriett Wright's estate in March of 2018. DIBS actually spent more money than collected but carried over \$103,079 from the previous year.
- Realistically, DIBS needs to explore additional funding sources in order
 to expand its ability to acquire more properties since bequests similar to that of Harriett Wright occur rarely, and the
 donations from the current membership do not provide enough money per year to pay for the purchase of even one of the
 increasingly costly lots on the island.







WHAT DO THESE NUMBERS MEAN?

Dauphin Island Bird Sanctuaries, Inc. is a non-profit, all-volunteer group of individuals who share a common goal of preserving as much un-developed habitat on Dauphin Island as possible. To meet this goal, the majority of our expenditures are spent on the purchase of land on the island with a focus on wooded and/or wetland properties that sustain the best "birdy" habitat. We were successful this year in that we were able to purchase three important properties, but this was largely due to the magnanimous gift from Harriett Wright's estate. Her generosity will be replicated rarely and so DIBS must seek other sustainable sources of income.

DIBS Executive Board Meetings (Officers and Board Members) were conducted on 4 occasions in 2018:



MEMBER INVOLVEMENT



During 2018, three experienced DIBS birders who live on Dauphin Island created a program to bring birding awareness to a class of fourth grade students at Dauphin Island Elementary School. The experienced birders, Don McKee, Eugenia Carey, and Ralph Havard worked together to provide binoculars, Stokes field guides, and birding Activity Books to each of the 13 students in the 4th grade class. Bird talks in the classroom were arranged, and several off-campus field trips were organized so that the students could practice using their binoculars to locate birds on the island.

When asked why they started this program, Don McKee replied that the group wanted to build more positive relationships with the island residents who were not familiar with birding as a hobby. By reaching out to the younger members of the island community and getting them involved and more knowledgeable about birds and their environment, Don's group hoped to foster a permanent connection between the island's human inhabitants and the specialized avian habitat that is located on Dauphin Island.

At the end of the school year, the students were allowed to take their birding

equipment home to continue to enjoy their new hobby.


